INTRODUCING LINK WORKERS

In 2011 Alzheimer Scotland first described their 5 Pillar Model of Post-Diagnostic Support: understanding the illness and managing symptoms, supporting community connections, peer support, planning for future decision-making and care. A Link Worker would work alongside the person, their partner and family and ensure that the person is given the opportunity, help and support to develop a robust personal plan enabling each person to live well and independently with dementia for as long as possible.

Six Link Workers took up post in Edinburgh in December 2013. We come from a range of backgrounds: Social Work, Social Care and Occupational Therapy and bring an eclectic and complementary skill mix to these posts. We are set up in bases throughout the city - Pilton, Leith, Niddrie and Wester Hailes.

As part of Dementia Awareness Week, three of us in the south of the city will host a stall outside Peacocks Fashion store in Cameron Toll Shopping Centre on Thursday 5 June. Please do come along and speak to us to find out more about what we do. *Fiona Robertson, Link Worker*
